

LGBT2SQ Youth in BC

- 15% of male and 23% of female B.C. high school students identify as gay, lesbian, bi or not exclusively heterosexual.
- 1% of B.C. high school students identify as transgender and 5% of Aboriginal students identify as Two-Spirit
- 38% of British Columbia's street-involved youth identify as gay, lesbian, bi or not exclusively heterosexual.

Why is this work important?

- 64% of queer and trans students in BC feel unsafe in school especially in change rooms and washrooms, and because of bullying, violence and homophobic slurs.
 - 42% of BC LGBTQ K-12 students report being victims of cyberbullying compared to 14% of non-LGBTQ students.
 - 90% of Canadian trans youth hear trans-phobic comments daily or weekly from other students.
- 69% of Canadian trans youth have expressed suicidal ideation in the last year, compared with 8-11% of the general youth population.



Protective Factor – School Connectedness

- Trans youth who report high levels of connectedness are twice as likely to report having good mental health.
- Research has shown that having any supportive adult inside or outside the family reduces suicidality, and increases happiness and self-esteem.
- In schools with anti-homophobia policies, students are:
 - less likely to hear homophobic comments;
 - o less likely to be the target of harassment; and
 - less likely to abuse alcohol, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity.





Accomplishments to Date

- ✓ Formed SOGI Working Group (incl. BCTF)
- ✓ Hosted SOGI Education Leadership and Policy Summits
- ✓ Implemented province-wide SOGI 1 2 3 campaign
- ✓ Created instructional samples for educators to support the new curriculum
- ✓ Continued partnership with ARC Foundation new Provincial SOGI Education Lead
- ✓ Ensured codes of conduct/anti-bullying polices are SOGI inclusive





Current State

- 59 of 60 Boards of Education and all independent schools have updated their codes of conduct and policies re SOGI.
- Ministry staff are working with the remaining district (Nisga'a).
- Development of educational videos and eLearning modules –
 September 2017 release.
- Provincial SOGI Network
 meeting on Oct 4, 2017 49
 participating school districts



Work Ahead

- 1. Provide provincial leadership to support SOGI inclusive education
- 2. Build school cultures where all students and staff feel safe, connected and welcomed
- 3. Support educators and parents with tools and resources
